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OUR PRIORITIES



Climate action – at an institutional and individual level - remains one of the Office of Sustainability and the Sustainability Committee's top priorities. Reaffirmed by the College's Laudato Si Action Plan (page 10) and elevated in the Transformation 2028 Strategic Plan, fulfilling our Climate Action Plan through operational, educational and co-curricular initiatives demonstrates our contribution to a more equitable and sustainable future.

This year we were thrilled to welcome the Saint Mary's inaugural cohort of Climate Action Corps Fellows to aid in our efforts. Molly Clemons (Sonoma State '23), Andrea Solis (Los Medanos '23), Erin Dalton (SMC '23), and Vera Hammond (UC Merced '23), pictured below, were busy during their 11 month term. These full time AmeriCorps fellows planted 210 native plants and 13 trees on campus and in Richmond schools, distributed hundreds pounds of fresh, organic, campus-grown food to the campus community and diverted 1,017 pounds of organic waste (compost), and have engaged 748 members of our on and off campus community to date. They have done so in close collaboration with our incredible team of sustainability student leaders and interns, as well as external and campus partners.

We were blown away at what they've accomplished in their short time here, and we are thrilled that two of them will be staying on for a second fellowship term next year!


CENTERING FOOD JUSTICE

A current project underway with the aim of expanding sustainability-related offerings is to develop recommendations and plans to utilize our resource-rich 420 acre campus for equitable and sustainable solutions. The campus as a living laboratory model provides opportunities for the Saint Mary's community to advance sustainability and justice through place-based research, internships and teaching. A natural fit to test and develop this living lab model is in Saint Mary's half-acre campus garden. This year, we added two new programs focused specifically on food justice, successfully utilizing our outdoor educational space and working landscape to foster community while enhancing physical and emotional health and addressing equity and access in our agrifood systems.

February

In February, the garden launched a new food justice initiative with the Gael Pantry. On a weekly basis, our fellows and interns harvest fresh, organic produce and deliver the fruits, vegetables and herbs to the Gael Pantry refrigerator. The Gael Pantry, managed by the incredible Mission & Ministry team is located behind the Soda Center.

June

In June, we were thrilled to announce the opening of our collaborative Gael Pantry and Legacy Garden summer farm stand. The stand is open every Wednesday 12-2pm in Ferroggiaro Quad during the summer.

All are welcome at the Farm Stand, however, students are given priority during the first hour and the rest of the campus community (staff, faculty, Brothers) is encouraged to stop by during the second hour. Goods from the Gael Pantry will be offered to students only.

We have long wanted to make Legacy Garden produce, flowers, herbs and honey more accessible to our broader campus community with a priority to serve food insecure students. We have several people to thank for making this a reality. The collaborative nature of the Farm Stand paired with goods from the Gael Pantry grew out of conversations in the Essential Needs Committee - a big thank you to Niloufar Azadeh, Student Support Coordinator in the Office of Student Life, who leads our Essential Needs programs, as well as Samantha Flores, Daniel McCarthy and Carrie Davis in the MMC for this collaboration.

Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation generously awarded the Office of Sustainability a hedgerow kit complete with 90 California native shrubs and plants. Many of these natives are drought-tolerant by nature, and provide critical food and habitat for natives and pollinators. 












This year, we were excited to launch the Saint Mary's Laudato Si Action Plan. This action plan is a response to the call by Pope Francis' encyclical Laudato Si and the 2024 apostolic exhortation, Laudate Deum. Both Laudato Si and Laudate Deum appeal to "every person living on this planet" for an inclusive dialogue about how we are shaping the future of our earth. Pope Francis calls on the Church and the world to acknowledge the urgency of our environmental challenges and to join him in embarking on a new path.

As a proud member of the Laudato Si Action Platform (LSAP), we developed an action plan grounded in the seven LSAP Goals as a framework to highlight our current and future actions. These draw from our Saint Mary's sustainability and climate-related planning and policy documents, including our Climate Action Plan, the Transformation 2028 strategic plan, and our Sustainable Food Plan and Sustainable Purchasing Policy.

Drawing on the global Lasallian commitment to sustainability, we join other Lasallian universities in this effort through the International Association of Lasalle Universities Global Compact initiative. The Office of Sustainability and Office of Mission have partnered to create this plan, which links our institutional climate action goals with our Lasallian Catholic mission and identity, to work together and by association to transform lives for a more sustainable and just world.

This plan goes hand-in-hand with our campus Climate Action Plan. Updated (Spring 2024) greenhouse gas emissions profile can be viewed on our Sustainability website.



This spring we celebrated our incredible graduating Sustainability Student Leaders who worked tirelessly to move the needle on sustainability efforts throughout their time at Saint Mary's.


